You're Officially a Bar-Ilan Student

Now that you've been accepted as a Bar-Ilan University (BIU) student, you'll need to know a few things about studying in Israel and at Bar-Ilan – before you leave home.

Visa Information

All students need to apply for a study visa prior to arriving in Israel – unless you have already made *Aliyah* (immigrated to Israel). Before approaching the local Israeli consulate, you must obtain a letter from Bar-Ilan indicating your acceptance to the

university, your field of study, and the exact dates your studies begin. This letter can be provided by the specific department or, in some cases, by the International School.

Visa information is provided to us by the Israeli Ministry of Interior and may change. We recommend that you review the information about tourist and student visas on the ministry website.

Health Insurance

Calling Israel from Abroad

The international dialing code for calling Israel is +972. When dialing from your country, you first add the number to dial out of your country, then Israel's dialing code, and then the number without the "o" that precedes it. For example, the International School's number is 03 738 4245 if you're dialing locally, but +972 3 738 4245 if you're dialing from outside the country (or using your international

number in Israel).

Welcome to Israel: An Introduction

Bar-Ilan University is situated in Ramat Gan, a city in the Tel Aviv District of Israel. It is located east of the municipality of Tel Aviv and is part of the greater Tel Aviv metropolitan area (Gush Dan).

Ramat Gan is home to one of the world's major diamond exchanges and many high-tech industries, but it also has many attractions for residents and visitors. These include the Ramat Gan National Park, the Maccabi Sports Museum, and the Museum of Israeli Art, among others. There are theaters and cinemas, many shopping malls, plenty of pubs and restaurants with cuisine from all corners of the world, and more.

Bar-Ilan University is a short ride to all the most popular spots, beaches, museums, and historic sites in Tel Aviv Jaffa,

and an hour from the historic city of Jerusalem. People in Israel love the outdoors and you'll see runners, cyclists, people walking dogs, and others just enjoying the beautiful weather.

As Israel is a small country, it is easy to travel north or south and enjoy a wonderful weekend away, whether you'd like to experience a night in a Bedouin tent in the Negev, hike the Israel Trail, walk through the great crater, take a canoe out on the Kinneret, visit Haifa or the Golan Heights, or do a tour of the wine farms in the area.

Israel has a good public transport system that will take you almost anywhere you wish to go throughout the country. You'll find buses within easy walking distance from campus, which will get you to the main bus and train stations in Tel Aviv. You will also be able to rent bicycles or scooters to get around the city.

But before you experience Israel and the university, here are a few important things to know when you arrive.

Israel's Currency

Israel's currency is made up of shekels (*shkalim*) and agorot. One shekel equals 100 agorot. There are 20, 50, 100, and 200 shekel bills; 1, 5, and 10 shekel coins; and 10 or 50 agorot coins. The symbol for shekels is \mathbb{D} . (NIS = New Israeli Shekel; ILS = Israeli Shekel)

Currency Exchange at the Airport

It's usually more cost-effective to opt for an ATM/Cash Machine (*Caspomat* in Hebrew) than an airport exchange kiosk to exchange currency and there are several ATMs inside Terminal 3. However, if you prefer to use a bank to exchange currency, you'll find a Bank Hapoalim counter at the arrival hall where you pick up your baggage between conveyor belts 6 and 7.

SIM Card Options at the Airport

Bar-Ilan University's International School, in cooperation with **o19 Mobile**, offers international students a special SIM card deal in order to make your stay in Israel as pleasant and productive as possible.

Once you have signed up for one of the options offered, you will receive a confirmation email. You must keep this letter and present it to the **o19 Mobile** vendor at Ben-Gurion Airport in order to collect your SIM card after landing.

NOTE: The SIM card provider may change. Please check our website before leaving your home country.

How to get to BIU from Ben Gurion Airport

There are many ways to get to Bar-Ilan University from the airport. You can take a taxi, bus, or a combination of train and bus. BIU doesn't have a train station nearby yet so you will need to take the train to Tel Aviv Hashalom train station and

You will be handed a blue slip of paper (in place of the entry stamp on your passport) by Immigration officials. It is advised to keep this blue slip until you leave Israel, as it contains information regarding your date of entry and more.

catch a bus from there. Bus numbers 68, 69, 45, 61, 161 will take you to Bar-Ilan. You can find more information on the trains at rail.co.il/en or on the buses at bus.co.il.

The best way to determine your route if you plan to use public transport is to download the "Moovit" app. It provides fairly accurate details of routes, times, bus numbers, and where to find them. This app is a great help if you want to find your way around Israel easily.

If you'd like to use a taxi, you will find a taxi stand outside the arrivals section on your left. According to regulations, only taxis at this stand have been approved to take passengers from the airport. There is a taxi coordinator who will give you a printed approval ticket for the driver.

NOTE: Charges are billed by meter only. **Taxis charge per person and per bag.** You will be able to see the prices at the taxi stand.

There is also a transportation information desk at the airport, if you need help.

Transport Apps and Rav-Kav Transport Card

Paying for public transport in Israel is entirely electronic. You can no longer pay for buses or trains with cash, unless you're using the *Monit Sherut* (shared mini-bus taxis).

There are now two payment options from which to choose – with a personal Rav-Kav card or with a smartphone app. Payment with the Rav-Kav card needs to be made in advance (before you travel) and the cash is stored on the card. Payment using the apps is made at the end of the month (in other words, you pay only for what you use). Buses and trains now have QR codes linked to the apps that you scan for payment.

These options cover transport on buses and trains throughout Israel.

Payment Through the Rav-Kav Card

The Rav-Kav card is a smart card used to make electronic payments. You can get one at the airport on your arrival. The office is situated in the reception hall next to exit gate 2.

You can also buy the travel card at any central bus station, or you can order it online. These are personal cards and **you will be** eligible for student benefits.

To buy the card at a central bus station, you will need to show your passport. To change the status of your card to student, you will need your passport and certificate of studies. This can be done on campus at the Information and Student Service Center (Building 502, Room 19).

You can also charge the card at this center or use the Rav-Kav Online app, which you can download to your phone. This app allows you to scan your card so that you can load cash onto it, view your history, check your balance, apply for a student discount, and more.

Payment Through the Apps

There are various apps from which to choose – Moovit, Pango, Cello, and Rav-Pass by HopOn. Moovit includes the train and bus schedules and shows you how to get from one place to another. It also provides an option for ride sharing for a small fee. Download the relevant app/s to take advantage of these paperless payment options. They are all available in the Apple App Store and on Google Play.

Accessing the University

Whenever you enter, you will be required to present your identity document (ID card or passport) to the security guard at the gate. You may be asked to show your acceptance letter the first time, so make sure you have it with you.

Taxis are allowed to enter campus.

Parking On and Around Campus

There are four parking lots located around the university:

- Yehudit parking lot near Wohl Center.
- Music parking lot on Jabotinsky Street, Givat Shmuel, behind the Music building (1005).
- Sport parking lot on Max and Anna Webb Street, near Gate 10, across from the Wohl Center.
- The Wohl Center parking lot.

Guests pay NIS 20 for the entire day. BIU Student Association members (who pay welfare fees) pay NIS 10 for the entire day.

If you park in the street, there are parking apps like Pango and Cello that let you time your stay and pay for parking digitally.

If you are traveling by car with a GPS system, the street adjoining the university is Max and Anna Webb Street (Ramat Gan) and the nearby neighborhood is called Ramat Ilan (Giv'at Shmuel).

Once you are on campus, you'll be able to use Bar-Ilan's shuttle bus to get around.



Campus Access Gates

- Gate 1 Main Gate for vehicles (employees only). Max and Anna Webb Street opposite Ramat Ilan Shopping Center. Open 24 hours.
- Gate 2 Pedestrians only. Max and Anna Webb Street opposite Ramat Ilan Shopping Center. Open weekdays from 6:30 to 22:00 and Fridays and holidays from 6:30 to 14:00.
- Gate 5 Pedestrians only. Max and Anna Webb Street opposite the Wohl Center. Open weekdays from 6:30 to 22:00 and Fridays and holidays from 6:30 to 14:00.
- Gate 10 Vehicles (pre-arranged) and pedestrians. Max and Anna Webb Street near Dahan Park and the dormitory complex. Open weekdays from 6:00 to 18:00 and Fridays and holidays from 6:00 to 14:00.
- Gate 15 Pedestrians only. Jabotinsky Street near the dormitory complex. Open weekdays from 7:30 to 0:00 and from 7:30 on Friday until 0:00 on Saturday night.
- Gate 20 Pedestrians. Jabotinsky Street between the Music Building (1005) and the Engineering Building (1100). Open weekdays, Sundays, and holidays from 6:30 to 14:00.
- Gate 25 Pedestrians only. Herzog Street in front of the "Cube" association building (510) and Emunah daycare (802). Open weekdays from 6:30 to 18:00 and Fridays and holidays from 6:30 to 13:00.
- Gate 30 Pedestrians only. Serves those coming by bus through Geha (Road 4) Highway or from Ramat Amidar (in Ramat Gan). Open weekdays from 6:30 to 00:00 and Fridays and eve of holidays from 6:30 to 00:00.
- Gate 40 Pedestrians only. Maccabit Road 471. Open weekdays from 6:30 to 18:00 and Fridays and eve of holidays from 6:30 to 12:00.

The closest entrances to the International School are through gate 1 (vehicles, must be pre-arranged) and gate 2 (pedestrians). After working hours, you can access gate 1 on foot. All gates are closed to vehicles on Shabbat.

Extending Exam Time

Olim students/tourists, who have been in Israel up to seven years from the date of Aliyah/arrival in Israel, are eligible in all degree programs for a 25% extension on exam time (up to 30 minutes overall per exam) with no penalty for spelling errors.

Accounting Students Only

In addition, *olim* students/tourists, who have been in Israel for up to 10 years from the date of Aliyah/arrival in the country, are eligible for a 30-minute time extension overall for each section of exams in accounting certificate studies. A letter confirming all relevant test accommodations is granted by the Department for Olim.

Translation of Exams

Olim students/tourists, who have been in Israel up to seven years from the date of Aliyah/arrival in the country, are in their first year of their Bachelor's or Master's degree, and have not studied in Hebrew before, are eligible for translation of their exams into English for up to four exams per semester. Exercising this right is conditional upon approval by the instructor.

Translation requests are to be applied through the In-Bar system under "Administrative Requests".

Students taking an exam translated into English are not eligible for extended time on that exam. Request for exam translations must be submitted at least two weeks prior to the exam date.

Tutoring

Olim students receiving academic financial assistance from the Student Authority (*Minhal HaStudentim*) in the Ministry of Aliyah and Absorption are eligible to receive 10 hours of semester lessons per semester at a subsidized rate. The request for a tutor should be submitted via a request form (obtained through the Department for Olim) at the beginning of each semester.

Accessibility and Special Needs

Bar-Ilan University provides facilities that are easily accessible for all students with special needs. Resources are also available for the learning disabled, the visually impaired, the hearing impaired, and students living with other physical disabilities.

Sybil Wigdor Student Support and Accessibility Unit

Students living with disabilities are invited to contact the Sybil Wigdor Student Support and Accessibility Unit for academic and technical support, including mentoring/tutoring, reading materials aloud, photocopying and/or recording lectures, library orientation, test rewrites, special considerations during exams, and more.

This unit offers study rooms with specialized equipment for differently-abled students, including special computers and recording tapes, as well as other means of academic assistance.

Prayer services are conducted on campus three times a day at several locations. Schedules are posted all around the campus.

Many of Bar-Ilan's religious students, including many new *olim* (immigrants), undertake a rigorous Jewish studies curriculum alongside full undergraduate or graduate degree programs in all university faculties. These take place at the Beit Midrash (Kollel) for men and the Midrasha (for women).







The Campus Rabbi's Office, headed by Rabbi Shlomo Shefer, regularly holds Torah lessons (*shiurim*) and organizes various cultural programs related to Shabbat, the Jewish holidays, and more on campus.

Lessons are held in Hebrew, English, French, and Russian.



About Safed (Tsfat)

Safed is the highest city in the Galilee. Summer here is nice and warm and winters are cold and occasionally snowy. The ancient city dates back to the fortified town in the Upper Galilee mentioned in the writings of the Roman-Jewish historian, Josephus, and to the Crusader period in the 12th century.

Safed is home to a large community of Jews who practice Kabbalah, a mystical form of Judaism. The Artists' Quarter is still a hub of activity and is situated just south of the Old Jewish Quarter in the Old City.

Getting to Safed from Ben Gurion Airport


It is best to plan your arrival for a weekday (Sunday-Thursday) as there is no public transportation to Safed over the weekend (Friday-Saturday). Please notify your PI/lab manager to let them know when you will be arrive so they know when to expect you.

The least expensive option would be to take a train from the airport to Karmiel (trains leave every 30-60 min and the trip takes about 2.5 hours – view the schedule here: rail.co.il/en).

From Karmiel, take the Nateev-Express bus (numbers 364, 363 or 361) to the Safed central bus station (white-orange buses). This journey takes about 45-60 minutes. From the bus station, it is a 10-15 minute walk to the faculty, or you can take bus numbers 6, 7 or 13 (also Nateev-Express bus company – nateevexpress.com).

Please Note: The last train from Ben Gurion Airport to Karmiel is at 21:35. You will need to arrive a few hours before the last train to make sure you have enough time to do everything you need to do before this. See Section 3 above. If your flight arrives too late to catch the last train, we suggest you stay overnight in Tel Aviv so you don't have to worry about arriving too late in Safed.

Accommodation

There are no dorms at the Faculty of Medicine. Most of our international students rent a flat (either single or shared with flat mates) in the area nearby the faculty.

The most common website for finding a place for rent is Yad2, a website that advertises products for sale as well as housing (yad2.co.il/realestate/rent). The website is currently only in Hebrew. Your lab mates, lab manager, and Israeli friends should be able to assist you.

Section 7 Cross-Cultural Crash Course

A Quick Summary

Israel is home to many cultures and religions. The country welcomes people from all over the world no matter their affiliation. This section provides a summary of Israeli culture, the local holidays and traditions, and some behavioral norms in the country to make your stay easier and more comfortable.

Israeli Society Cultural Norms

Some sectors of the population have high expectations of gender separation and modest dress, most notably ultrareligious sects in Bnei Brak, Jerusalem, and Safed (Tsfat). If you are walking through any of the ultra-Orthodox areas in these cities, please make sure you adhere to the dress code so you don't offend any of the residents.

Observant Jews do not eat milk and meat together. As such, kosher restaurants will be either "meat" or "dairy" (or vegetarian and vegan, which are neutral, called "Parve"). If, after a meat meal at a kosher restaurant, you need milk with your coffee, you can ask for soy or almond milk.

Pedestrians are expected to stop and wait at red lights before they cross the street. Not everyone keeps to this. Please be careful as drivers (motorcars, scooters, bicycles, and motorbikes) don't always see you when you cross.

Neighborhoods with schools have volunteer crossing guards. These guards may be young students. Please cross only when they say so.


Some neighborhood parks request quiet between the hours of 14:00-16:00. Some stores are also closed during those hours.

In the past, it was common to sit up front with cab drivers, but this has changed for the most part since COVID-19 regulations. Some drivers love to talk, although not all of them speak English. Uber in Israel is different from other countries as it uses taxi drivers. Other taxi services include Gett Taxi and Yango.

It is customary to tip waiters in restaurants between 10% and 20%. Cab drivers are generally not tipped, but the choice is yours.

Most houses and apartments are heated with solar water boilers. On cloudy and cold days, the electric boiler will need to be turned on.

Ritual Hand-Washing Cups: You may see large cups with two handles near sinks in public places, offices, and restaurants. These are cups for ritual hand washing and not for drinking.



Shabbat and Religious Jewish Holidays

Sunday to Thursday is the typical work week for businesses in Israel. However, retailers, malls, doctors, and other healthcare facilities are open on a Friday morning, and schools and universities still have classes.

Saturday (Sabbath/Shabbat) is the national weekly day of rest. Many stores and cultural sites are closed, so it's best to check ahead of time before making plans. Certain Jewish holidays are also treated like Shabbat. They fall in September/October (Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Simchat Torah), April (Pesach), and May (Shavuot).

The Jewish calendar year starts with **Rosh Hashanah** (Jewish New Year), which is in September or October depending on the Hebrew (Lunar) calendar. This is the only holiday in Israel that is celebrated over two days. The rest are all only one day.

Yom Kippur, also known as the Day of Atonement, is the holiest day in the Jewish calendar. Jews traditionally observe this holy day with a 25-hour fast and all-day prayer. There are no radio or television broadcasts, airports are shut down, there is no public transportation, and all shops and businesses close early on the eve of Yom Kippur.

It is considered impolite to eat in public on **Yom Kippur**, to play music, or to drive any vehicles (except for emergency service vehicles). Bicycles are allowed. There are no legal prohibitions, but we do strongly suggest that you respect your neighbors on this important day.

Sukkot is known as the Feast of Tabernacles or Booths. It commemorates the years that the Jews spent in the desert on their way to the Promised Land and celebrates the way in which they were protected under difficult desert conditions. Meals are eaten in a *sukkah* or temporary dwelling for a week, and some people even sleep in these *sukkot* (booths).

Simchat Torah is the day when Jews rejoice in their relationship with the Torah. It also marks the completion of the Torah-reading cycle and the beginning of the next one.

Pesach (Passover) celebrates the Exodus from Ancient Egypt, the journey from slavery to freedom. It is observed by avoiding

leaven (a substance, usually yeast, that causes dough to rise) and is highlighted by the Pesach Seder (Passover meal), which includes drinking four cups of wine and eating *matzah* (unleavened bread). A retelling of the story of the Exodus is part of the *Seder*.

Shavuot (Feast of Weeks) celebrates the harvest and the time when the Jews received the Torah at Mount Sinai. Traditionally, dairy products (savory and sweet, especially cheesecake) are eaten during Shavuot.

Chol HaMoed are the intermediate (in-between) days of **Sukkot** and **Pesach**. In other words, they start and end with a religious holiday. While these are regular workdays, schools and universities are closed during this time.

Shabbat begins at sundown on Friday and religious Jewish holidays start at sundown on the evening before the holiday. The country slows down around midday (most stores close around 15:00) the day before. Make sure you plan for the weekend and holidays and do your shopping and other activities beforehand.

Buses and Trains on Shabbat and Religious Holidays

Most buses and trains in the Tel Aviv metropolitan area (which includes Ramat Gan) do not run on Shabbat. Services end on Friday mid-afternoon and resume on Saturday night (times depend on time of year – summer or winter – and when Shabbat starts and ends). *Monit Sherut* (shared mini-bus taxis) continue to run in Tel Aviv and between cities.

There is a free (for now) Weekend Transportation public bus service that runs across Tel Aviv and surrounding areas on Friday nights between 18:00 and 02:00 and Saturdays between 09:00 and 17:00. They are not accessible from Bar-Ilan University (Ramat Gan).

There are no buses or trains on religious Jewish holidays.

Other Jewish and Israeli Holidays

Purim, which takes place in February/March, commemorates the day Esther, Queen of Persia, saved the Jewish people from execution. It is always celebrated with fancy dress parties and street carnivals.



Chanukah is a week-long holiday commemorating the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem at the time of the Maccabean Revolt. It is also known as the Festival of Lights and falls in November/December.

Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day), Yom Hazikaron (Memorial Day for Israel's Fallen Soldiers), and Yom Ha'atzmaut (Israel Independence Day) are in April/May, while the Memorial Day for Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin is in October/November.

These are not religious holidays, but they are very important days in the Israeli calendar. Many shops are still open and public transport still runs, albeit it less frequently and limited in certain areas.

A siren is sounded throughout the country on Israel's memorial days, so don't be frightened. This usually takes place at 20:00 on the eve of the memorial day and 10:00/11:00 on the morning of the holiday. People stop everything and stand still while the siren is sounded. Be careful if you are near the road as cars will pull over.

On the eve of each of the memorial days, classes end at 18:00. During memorial services on campus, there are no classes and all BIU libraries are closed.

Local Safety Tips

Bomb shelters/safe spaces can be found in most buildings and in public areas, including parks and residential streets, on and off campus. If you are not near a shelter, the safest place is in the stairway of a building away from glass doors and windows. If you are in a car, pull over and lie flat on the sidewalk with your arms over your head.

When driving, there is no "right on red" in Israel.

Tap water is considered safe to drink, but many people prefer to use jugs with water filters.

Personal bags are often checked by security personnel upon entering public buildings (e.g. malls, government offices, hospitals). Please do not refuse to have your bags checked. This is for everyone's safety.

General Safety On and Off Campus

Safety in Residences or Campus Buildings

If you need to speak with someone who is trained to help you after an attack or for any other reason, there are on-campus and off-campus options.

On-Campus Counseling Services


